From Pastor's Desk

October. This is the month when we start to see things change. This is the month when all of Michigan begins to transition stages. What kinds of things do we anticipate in October? Well, let's start with the simple things. Our summer clothes are packed away (begrudgingly perhaps). Our winter clothes and jackets and boots are dragged out of the attic and dusted off (hoping that it all still fits this year after a pandemic quarantine). Air conditioning turns to heat. The overwhelmingly overstocked fall candles begin to saturate the air in every square inch of the house. Pumpkin spice lattes are the only kind of coffee that anyone sells anymore. The leaves turn colors. The grass sheds it's green to yellow. And of course- the days get shorter, the air gets colder, and the nights get longer. October! The transitionary month of the Midwest that marks a time of great change. However, no matter how many things change, the fact remains: we will always anticipate what comes our way. Jesus even says in Matthew 6 that we are not to be anxious about tomorrow because the God who clothes the grass of the field will do much more for you, his own child. The Lord who formed the light and created the darkness (Is. 45); the Lord who created the heavens and the earth, living things both visible and invisible (Col. 1); the Lord who formed every beast of the field and bird of the air (Gen. 2) will never leave you nor forsake you (Deut. 31). 


School's Christmas Shoppe is Coming

Do you ever wonder what

people will say about you after the Lord has called you home? When people remember you, will they think about your generosity, your kindness, may be how boisterous you were? Will they think about how you rooted for the 'other' sports team or about the homemade cookies you baked for Bible Study. There are hundreds of little moments, words and actions that we have with each other through our lives and you never know how meaningful those moments can be to those who continue to live on earth. Perhaps you are familiar with Jesus' words about the relationship between faith and moving mountains.

BUT HAVE YOU EVER HEARD ABOUT A MOUNTAIN MOVING A PERSON?

THAT IS EXACTLY WHAT HAPPENED RECENTLY TO A WOMAN WE WILL CALL SARAH.

Sarah is from an Eastern European country and was visiting family who had emigrated to the United States. Although a God-honoring and traditionally religious person, she didn't understand what it meant when her family tried to describe the reality of trusting personally in Christ. Sarah is attractive, well educated and has a well-deserved reputation in her country as an outstanding musician. She has studied with some of her country's most talented musical elite and is known far beyond the borders of her nation. In spite of all this, Sarah could not quite grasp the concept of the grace and grandeur of a loving God who desired a relationship with her.

Wanting Sarah to experience much of the beauty in this part of the world, they traveled with her to some of this area's most famous sites. She was thrilled to see wildlife coming into urban neighborhoods, deep gorges cut through centuries of granite-like rock, blue skies with mountain peaks piercing the clouds. Each Sunday they visited a different church so Sarah could glimpse the wide variety of Christian worship.

And then one afternoon Sarah's family drove her up to one of this country's highest peaks, over 14,000 feet high. Expecting her to surely enjoy the experience, they were unprepared for her stunned response as she stood in the silence of the peak, gazing at clouds both above and beneath her, at the valleys far below. She suddenly spread out her arms and cried, "Oh, this is the God you're talking about!"

Later conversation revealed that at that moment on the mountaintop, God lovingly revealed Himself to her in a way that spoke uniquely to her soul and she opened herself to all that He wanted to be for her. God used a mountain to move her into relationship with Himself.

PARENTING HELPS (first part series of four in a Harvard Family Research Project)

Starting School

I can still remember my daughter's first day of kindergarten; she had carefully selected which outfit she wanted to wear, distractedly picked at her waffles during breakfast, and nervously approached the school playground holding onto my hand.

As I walked her over to the kindergarten line, I hoped her years of education would be fulfilling, that her classmates would be friendly, that her teachers would be kind and wise, and that she would be successful.

What I didn't know then is just how important my participation would be to her scholastic achievement. Parental involvement is actually one of the greatest predictors of a child's school success. Numerous research studies demonstrate that family engagement promotes a range of benefits for students, including:

- improved school readiness,
- higher student achievement,
- better social skills and behavior,
- and increased likelihood of high school graduation.

But what exactly are parents supposed to do?

Consider The Messages You Send Think about your behavior

You model your attitude toward education through your own behavior. The messages that you send to your children, both directly through your words and indirectly through your actions, are quite powerful.

- Are you open to learning?
- Do your children see you read?
- Do you take an interest in what is happening in the world?
- Do you get excited about their new knowledge and growing understanding?

Think about your questions

Your questions are an important way to convey your interest. But rather than interrogate your children when they come home from school, let them tell you about their day. You can start with broad, open-ended requests, such as "Tell me something exciting that happened today." What they choose to focus on is an indicator of what is really important to them. Afterward, you can ask specific questions to satisfy your curiosity or help fill in the details.

Think about your focus

Another way you communicate your values is through complimenting certain behaviors and not others. In regard to school, do you want your kids to care more about good grades, a love of learning, staying out of trouble – or all of the above? Ideally, your kids will value all of these things, but sometimes it is not that easy.

Let's say that your child gets lost in a science website while completing a homework assignment. Are you glad that your child is showing intellectual curiosity or are you disappointed or frustrated that he ran out of time and rushed through the actual project? What if your child didn't complete classwork because he chose to stay with a sick friend in the nurse's office?

How you respond and the messages you send depend on the values you hold; and sometimes your values conflict with one another.
