From Pastor's Desk



Please, Lord. Just give us Christmas. Give us one uninterrupted, unphased, uninhibited, snowy, joyful, normal Christmas! Because right about now, we could use some Silent Nights and Holy Nights. We could use some Peace on Earth and Goodwill to Mankind. We are in desperate need of some Joy to the World. Lord, if possible, send your angels to appear to the shepherds around the world and reassure us of the hope we have in the baby whose very name means salvation! Whatever you do, just please don't take away our Christmas!

Have any of those thoughts run across your mind lately? Have you felt like one of the most loved and cherished holidays known to mankind is in jeopardy of being "cancelled"? After the last 9 months, I certainly wouldn't blame you. It just feels like we could use some authentic saving again. We need saving from this sickness; from these shutdowns; from this national hostility of an invisible enemy that threatens the very livelihood of our Christmas joy. We need saving. We need normal! It's going to be hard to sing our favorite hymns with masks shielding our proclamation. It's going to be heard to belt out our voices while singing O Come, All Ye Faithful when we know that so many families are not quite comfortable coming to church just yet. Sure, we'll sing to the Lord O Come, O Come, Emmanuel - just make sure he's 6 feet from us when he does come! We know Advent is here. We know Christmas is coming. But as we prepare ourselves for the coming of our Lord Jesus in his precious birth, how can we possibly prepare ourselves for what it might look like this year? Will churches be closed? Will homes be quarantined? Will Christmas be... taken away? What are we supposed to do?

There is no doubt: this Christmas will certainly be unique. Things may be very different this year. Joy may be stifled. Christmas jubilation may be suppressed. The exultation that St. Paul shares in the birth of our Lord may have to be restrained to safely consider CDC guidelines. But in any and every season, holiday, month, year, or day: we will nonetheless live in constant celebration for the baby born in the manger. The God in the barn. The Savior in the straw. We will call him Jesus because He is our salvation; our salvation that saves us from sin, guilt, shame, death, and yes- even invisible enemies that seek to threaten the joy of Christmas. Upon Gabriel's announcement to Mary, he said these words: He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High (Luke 11:32). You heard him right, Jesus is great. Great enough to silence storms, command demons, banish viruses, empty graves (including his own), and above all-give to you the Christmas joy of knowing that the Great One is all for you.

So, whatever happens this month or the next month or the month after that, know that there is something that will never be taken from you. There is something that will never be silenced. There is something that will never be lost. It is your Christmas joy- a joy that resounds through every month of the year. A joy that finds its foundation in Christ. Rejoice in the Lord always (Philippians 4:4). This, we will do because we know that "for the joy set before him" (Hebrews 12:2), Jesus has been born in the manger, died on the cross, and rose from the grave. And no one can take that away from us. Have a merry Christmas in the Lord! Rejoice; again, I will say, rejoice!



SERVANTDo you ever wonder where the 'giving of gifts' for Christmas started? Some stories tie the origin of gift giving to old Roman celebration called Saturnalia, timed around the mid-winter solstice, where the wealthy would serve their servants. The early Christians may have used this same time to establish a tradition of remembering the worship of the three wise men and their gifts to

the baby Jesus. In the 4th century, Saint Nicholas of Myra became more widely known in the Roman Catholic Church for his secret gift giving. In the early 1800's in New York, Clement Clarke Moore wrote a popular poem to more strongly influence some of the Christmas traditions called "A Visit from St. Nicholas" or as we know it, "The Night Before Christmas". Moore's poem was widely accepted and galvanized the modern idea of the secular Christmas celebrations we know today in the U.S.

The Christmas traditions our society practices in 2020 have a long and winding history, building upon legends, stories, and socio/economic influences. Christmas celebrations with family and friends become some of our fondest memories. Christmas gifts are thoughtful expressions of love that makes both giver and recipient feel good. The Christmas Holiday is wonderful, but we need to be grounded as Christians and ensure that the main point of our Christmas is not the gifts we give, but the gift we receive from God – Jesus.

For Christians, there is deeper meaning to 'gift giving'. Gift giving is really a central theme in the Bible and in our relationship with God. God has given us all that we have, all that we are and in return for His awesome love, we also give. There are many opportunities to give at St. Paul as we approach the celebration of the birth of Christ. Supporting the food pantry at Thanksgiving, decorating the church, sending "Blessed Christmas" cards to friends and family, sharing messages to brothers and sisters in the congregation who we miss, singing in the family choir on Christmas Eve – these are all wonderful gifts we can share with each other. Ultimately, the greatest gift we can give, is sharing the message of salvation, given to use through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus.

Contributing to St. Paul using an Individual Retirement Account (IRA)

Under federal law, individuals age 70½ or older who own traditional Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs) are required to take an annual, minimum distribution.

Are you aware that you may redirect some or all the minimum required distribution (MRD) to charity, up to \$100,000 annually, and possibly enhance your standard deduction while preserving more liquid assets for other, equally important uses?

St. Paul Lutheran Church joyfully receives IRA gifts that can support the mission of Christian Education through the day school, St. Paul supported missionaries, local community outreach, the preparation and care for church workers, and carry out other aspects of our Lord's mission.

How does it work?

A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian, payable to a qualified charity. QCDs can be counted toward satisfying your minimum required distributions (MRDs) for the year, if certain rules are met.

In addition to the benefits of giving to charity, **a QCD excludes the amount donated from taxable income**, which is unlike regular withdrawals from an IRA. Keeping your taxable income lower may reduce the impact to certain tax credits and deductions, including Social Security and Medicare. Since it is already excluded from your taxable income, you can't take the itemized deduction (charitable donation) again. That would be double-dipping.

While many IRAs are eligible for QCDs—Traditional, Rollover, Inherited, SEP (inactive plans only), and SIMPLE (inactive plans only) * —there are requirements:

- You must be $70\frac{1}{2}$ or older to be eligible to make a QCD.
- QCDs are limited to the amount that would otherwise be taxed as ordinary income. This excludes non-deductible contributions.
- The maximum annual amount that can qualify for a QCD is \$100,000. This applies to the sum of QCDs made to one or more charities in a calendar year. (If, however, you file taxes jointly, your spouse can also make a QCD from his or her own IRA within the same tax year for up to \$100,000.) For a QCD to count towards your current year's MRD, the funds must come out of your IRA by your MRD deadline, generally December 31.

If you are having the money from your IRA going directly to the Charity, you do not deduct that amount on your tax return. Since the amount is going directly to the Charity that amount you withdrew from the IRA is not taxable to you. Because it is not taxable to you, you have not paid Federal tax on that amount, so you have already received the tax benefit.

These ornaments - called Chrismons - point to our LORD and Please take time to stop by the tree SAVIOR by their colors, by their shapes & most importantly, by their Scripture references.

Many St. Paul members have participated in the making of these Chrismons. Gerry Breyfogle originally brought this ministry of handcrafted sacred designs to St. Paul in the 1970s, when St. Paul began

Consider Your Connection to School

Think about getting involved

Parental involvement, such as attending school functions like back-to-school nights and concerts or volunteering in the library, is as important as helping with homework. Many working parents find it particularly hard to be a presence in their children's school. However, research indicates that it is worth the effort.

Although you initially may be puzzled as to how your presence can make such a difference, it's not so difficult to understand. You get to know the teachers and the administrators, and they get to know you. If you already have a relationship, you can more easily approach school personnel if problems occur, as suggested above.

Also, teachers are more likely to approach a parent whom they see at the school and whom they know is committed to their child's education.

Finally, engaging the school has been shown to be effective in getting to the bottom of a problem and providing the child with whatever support might be needed.

Think about how you handle problems

Parents without a connection to the school are more likely to ignore problems or to try to fix them on their own, often through closer supervision and increased demands, which typically leads to conflict with the child.

Or if parents intentionally keep school personnel out of the loop in an effort to have their children look "good," the silence can backfire because learning disabilities or missed concepts are best addressed as early as possible in a child's academic career.

In Summary

It is a fine line that parents walk in determining how to assist in their children's academic success. By showing a genuine interest, by refraining from actually doing the child's work, by addressing academic concerns, and by being a presence in the school, parents can help their children to do their best – now and in the future.





CHRISMONS

A Christogram; Latin: Christ Monogram (Handmade Christian symbols of the Church used as ornaments to decorate our Christmas tree.)

Symbols have played a very important part in the proclamation of the Christian faith. Christian art through the centuries has created hundreds of distinctive symbols to represent in visible form men's conception of the Christian religion. The Christmas trees used to decorate the Church at St. Paul in Royal Oak, Michigan are decorated with "Chrismons"—symbols from Christian history. To help you in the interpretation of some of the symbols on our tree, a brief description follows.

Nearly all Chrismons have been made in white and gold: White represents light, peace, joy, purity and Heaven. Gold symbolizes the majesty and glory of the Son of God.

If you are interested in making or repairing the "Chrismons" throughout the year, you can contact the Church Office for futher information.

THE CROSS

The Latin Cross, with the upper arm and two sides of equal length and the lower are twice as long, is form most commonly used.

The Greek Cross has all four arms of equal length.

The Celtic Cross is a Latin cross with a circle representing eternity placed at the junction of the arms.

The Crosslet is formed with 4 Latin crosses meeting in center and signifies the spread of Christianity to the 4 comers of the world.

The Jerusalem
Cross is formed
with four Tau
crosses meeting in
the center.

St. Andrews Cross-St. Andrew was reputed to have died on a cross of this shape.

The Cross of Constantine is the Chi Ro (XP) with the Chi (X) turned to form a cross. It signifies Christ, the conquering King.

The Tau Cross is "T" shaped.

The Passion Cross has pointed ends to remind us of points of nails, thorns and spear.

The Anchor Cross—the cross rises out of an anchor. An anchor symbolizes Christian hope.

The Cross Treflee-Three circles on the end of the arms symbolize the Trinity.

MONOGRAMS OF OUR LORD

X
Chi, or as we would write it X, is the 1st letter of the word of Christ in Greek.

XP
Chi Rho, the 1st two letters for Christ in the Greek alphabet. Sometimes the X is turned to form a cross. A 2nd interpretation is the Latin Christus Rex, Christ the King.

XC
XC are the 1st and last letter of ChrisT in Greek.

IHS
The 1st three letters
of JESus in Greek.

Star enumerates the sevenfold gifts of the Spirit. Eight-pointed Star-symbol of men's regeneration.

Serpent-"As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up" (John 3:14).

Butterfly--symbol of resurrection of Christ and man's hope of eternal life through grace and faith.

The Tongues of Flame, usually seven in number, symbolize the advent of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. The number seven represents the sevenfold gifts of the Spirit.

Scroll signifies written word of

prophesy; often used as a symbol of Advent.

An Open Bible, often shown with a lamp, is the symbol for the Word of God. "Thy Word is a lamp unto my feet" (Psalm 119:105.

A Shell depicts the sacrament of Holy Baptism.

The Lamb of God, Agnus Dei, shown sometimes with a banner and other times reclining, is a symbol inspired by passages of Scripture such as... "The next day he saw Jesus coming toward him and said, 'Behold the Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world" (John 1.29).

The Dove is the

symbol of the Holy Spirit. The dove in a descending position recalls the Day of Pentecost.

The Hand of God suggests the word of the psalmist; "His right hand and his holy arm, hath gotten him the victory" (Psalm 98:1).

The Fish is a symbol of Christ.

The Rose symbol of nativity of Christ. Other flowers also other symbolize truths-the lily of the valley symbolizes humility the of Jesus, and the daisy the innocence of Christ-Child. lily usually is shown in pictures of the mother of our Lord: a symbol of the virgin birth

M, or in Greek MU, is middle letter of the Greek alphabet. "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever.

SYMBOLS OF OUR LORD AND GOD

(Heb. 13:8)

The Circle, being a figure without beginning and ending, represents God who is both eternal and one. It symbolizes eternity.

The Triangle, all sides and angles equal, carries the idea of God's unity in showing that God is three person, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, all of whom are equal.

The Crown signifies the Kingship of our Lord through His victory over sin and death
