The Hard Part

My mother was the peacekeeper in the house. And we had a large house. The Andrzejewski household carried 6 people (and a dog). One mother. One father. Four children (three boys and one girl). As you could imagine, it was always a lively household. Every once and a while, us siblings would fight... as any other sibling would do. There was never any real winner in these petty arguments. More often than not, there was rarely a valid purpose. But I can tell you thisthere were always the consequences. Yes, we were grounded if we went too far. Yes, our favorite toys were taken away. But that wasn't the hard part. Not even close. The hardest part that our matriarchal peacekeeper enforced upon us was... the forgiveness. "Tell your brother you're sorry," mom would say. "Tell your sister that you forgive her," she would demand. In the heat of the moment, that was the last thing I wanted to do! If you have any idea of what I'm talking about, then you know that was the hardest part of growing up. The forgiveness. Because resentment and hatred and bitterness has a monstrous appetite. Grudges send us toward an infinite downward spiral. Revenge is never enough. It's much easier to hold on to hate than to let go of your hatred.

Why is that? Why is it so hard for us to forgive one another? Perhaps it's because the fires of irritation are too hot to put out at times. Perhaps it's because it may be too hard to heal whatever hurt that you felt. But in any case, you are told to "forgive one another, just as Christ forgave you" (Col. 3:13). Yikes. The hard part. But it also makes sense. Who are we to withhold forgiveness when it was Christ who had every right to withhold ours? Think about that. Did Jesus ever turn his back on us when "anger, wrath, malice, slander, and obscene talk" filled the hands and mouths of those who slaughtered him to the cross? Absolutely not. Could he have ignored us, or even more, returned the favor? Absolutely. But he didn't. Outrageous as it might seem, Christ loved the hateful. And even died for them too. And if He thinks that those people who condemned him to the cross, scourged his back, impaled his side, and left him for dead was worth forgiving... maybe we should reconsider "the hard part" of what our forgiving looks like. Does that make forgiving any easier? No. Painless? Probably not. But let me encourage you to remember this from Paul's words in Ephesians 2: ³¹ Let all bitterness and wrath and anger and clamor and slander be put away from you, along with all malice.³² Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you. That's right. Put it away from you. Bury that wrath at the foot of the cross and let His grace take its place. Set the example, just as Christ did for you. Extinguish those flames of bitterness with the waters of the forgiveness. Who knows... maybe the hard part of forgiveness may grow to be a little easier every time you do it. This world has a monstrous appetite-let's fill it with love.

Accepting What You Cannot Change

We can prevent a lot of frustration, disappointment, and stress by letting go of what we cannot control. I want certain people in my life to be different, and for many years I tried unsuccessfully to change them. I thought they needed my help to change, so I gave everything to try and change others who did not want to change. In the end, I was worn out and frustrated my efforts to change others were useless.

There are things in life no matter how hard we try to change them, won't. Being aware of what we can change is important. We can change ourselves but infrequently can change others or our circumstances. We can pray and ask God to intercede with our loved ones and circumstances, but we cannot control the outcome of our prayers. We have no control over how our prayers get answered. Sure having faith does and can help, but just because you have faith for something does not necessarily mean that it will happen the way you thought.

We should always have hope for change and that things in our lives will get better, but we should not stay stuck when we can't change something we don't like. If we stay too camped out around not accepting our reality it can lead to self-pity, anger, and bitterness. One of the reasons we become stuck in our suffering is that we are trying to control things that are beyond our control. If we focus all our energy on what we have no control over we can feel mentally and physically drained.

Acceptance of what you cannot control has many benefits:

- A more positive outlook
- Less worry and stress
- More energy from not trying to figure things out
- You will be able to move on and enjoy life again
- Depression will lessen or lift completely
- You will feel more peaceful and calmer

A change in perception must also take place for you to be able to let go and accept what you cannot change. If you believe the pain in your life will never end, your suffering will feel unbearable. There are times though we have to live with events that we don't know when will end, such as with COVID. During those times of uncertainty, you can develop new and better coping skills to help manage unknown times.

Most of us have felt uncertain and distressed when faced with situations we can't change; however no matter what the situations we face there is one thing that is in our control and that is our attitude and our response. Acceptance means letting go of our expectations for how we believe things should have turned out. Acceptance makes us feel lighter and as if a burden has been lifted.

Our theme for this school year is "In Him All Things Hold Together" based on Colossians 1: 15-20. As we begin the new year, there has been challenges as well as blessings. Like every school, we continue to deal with Covid-

EDU COMMENTS 19 issues. There are constant changes, sometimes weekly, with new recommendations or mandates. There are worker shortages, shipping delays, and unavailability of products.

These issues have affected the make-up of our staff for this school year. Mrs. Rita McClatchey and I are serving as co-principals this year. One of our upper-grade teachers accepted a new position at another school at the last moment. A nice problem is the continued growth of our preschool program necessitating staff adjustments.

But the Lord has provided for all our needs. We have added Mr. Henry Eising to our staff part-time as teacher in grade 5. Henry, a graduate of Hillsdale College, will teach Literature and History, giving Mr. Paul relief to fulfill his responsibilities at church. Mrs. Blyth Mackinder will have added responsibilities in the preschool as the program continues to grow.

Our kindergarten – 5th grade enrollment stands at 52 students. We retained some of the new students from last year who wanted in-person learning, but many returned to their local school districts this year. With enrollment very low in grades 6-8 and staffing problems, we discontinued these grades this year. Our plan is to add a grade each year based on the enrollment numbers.

Preschool numbers have exploded this year. We are near capacity at 29 students, and have added more class time to accommodate the increase. We are also considering adding another day of instruction if enrollment dictates the need.

We are looking forward to an exciting school year with many events and activities. Jesus remains with us through His Word. We can rejoice we have a school where all teaching and learning flows from God's Word because "In Him All Things Hold Together."
