## LIVE TODAY

It's been said that "worrying is like walking about with an umbrella waiting for it to rain." It's silly to picture that, isn't it? Unfortunately, worrying is the umbrella we carry with us every day of our lives.

The most common Greek word for "worry" is  $\mu\epsilon\rho\mu\nu\dot\alpha\omega$  (mer-im-nah'-o). It can be translated as "to be anxious, to care for, distracted, concerned, or pulled apart." It appears 19 times in the New Testament letters ranging from the Gospels to the Corinthians and to the Philippians. It's a compound of a verb and a noun. The verb is "divide." The noun is "mind." To be anxious, then, is to *divide the mind.* Anxiety chops up our attention, derails our purpose, and scatters our awareness in a dozen directions. We worry about the past: what we said or did. We worry about the future: tomorrow's assignments or the next decade's developments. Anxiety takes our attention from the right now and directs it back then or up there. The challenge is to keep our attention on the "right now."

Of all the people in the world who would understand what it means to worry, it would be Jesus. It was Jesus! Do you think he had anything to worry about? Oh, I don't know- maybe getting enough food for the day or getting enough sleep at night... or maybe saving the entire world by going through an excruciating and tortuous death on a cross? So, then, what does he have to say about worrying? Check out Matthew 6:25. (No really, do it!). Who does Jesus say will get your back? Check out Matthew 10:19-20. Who else will help you? Take a peek at Philippians 4:6. Once again, **who is by your side?** "The Lord is at hand," Paul says, so **rejoice** instead!

Why would you want to re-live yesterday? Now, I'm not saying forget about yesterday. But learn from it. Grow from it. But don't live in it. Why would you want to chase after tomorrow? It doesn't exist unless the Lord grants the seconds and minutes- and that's for HIM to worry about. I'm not saying that you should be ignorant of the future, it certainly deserves a glance. But it doesn't require an obsession. You can't change anything tomorrow until tomorrow. "The heavenly Father knows," Jesus says in Matthew 6. And that's all that we need to hear. But Christ goes on... "the heavenly Father knows all that you need."

So leave your problems with God and repeat after me- "I hereby resign as the ruler of the universe and will therefore relieve myself of its worries." Live today and rejoice- because the Lord promised that no matter what, you will live with him tomorrow too.

## Happy Mothers Day May 8, 2022







## Stewardship Spotlight

An article from the February edition of Michigan In-Touch, a newsletter from the Michigan District that is distributed along with the Lutheran Witness, was shared with me about 'planning for the future.' It made me think about some of the plans I've made in my life and how what I wanted simply didn't come to pass as expected. I think we all can reminisce about the plans we make from the time we are children or young

as expected. I think we all can reminisce about the plans we make from the time we are children or young adults, and as we get older and look back, we can see what we planned for probably didn't come to pass as expected.

Graduating from high school, I planned to be a pilot, be married by 25, and have all the children I was going to have by 30. I had a name picked out for the son I hoped I would eventually have. None of those things happened the way I planned. I work in an auto plant, was married at 28 (that wasn't so bad – pretty close to my 'plan') and eventually we were blessed with a daughter when I was 38.

There was another time where I made plans to replace a toilet in our first home. During its removal, a bunch of tiles were damaged (I didn't like the tile anyway). One little mistake led to another and what was originally intended to be a Saturday project turned very quickly into a complete bathroom renovation that took a few months to complete. The inconvenience, the dust and mess that were perpetually going on during the renovation was an unexpected nuisance. The expense was not really budgeted at the time either. However, the result was beautiful and the change in direction turned out to be significant upgrade for our home that my wife came to appreciate.

So, what does God tell us about making plans and how to manage when our plans don't go as expected. Proverbs 19:21 states:

This text is saying that we should trust in God in all situations that we encounter, even if they don't shake out exactly as we drew it up in our heads. In fact, even if everything goes to plan, we still know it is "the purpose of the Lord that stands."

It is an encouragement to make plans. When we make plans, we can be confident that God will continue to work through our success or failure and that everything that results from that planning is for the purpose of the Lord. My original plans for work and a family didn't happen in my timing or to my purpose. However, God provided me with a job that is rewarding, a loving wife with a caring heart, and He gave us the right daughter at a time when we had grown and matured so that we could give her our best. It is easy for me to look back and see God's purpose in how things have come to pass in my life and it is way better than any of my original plans.

The same applies to us as friends and members of St. Paul as we share our experiences, priorities, and concerns, planning for the future. We make a lot of plans; plans for the school auction, plans for a budget, plans for a capital campaign, plans for fellowship and community involvement, plans for the future of our church and school. When we collaborate on these plans, we do so understanding that not everything will look just like any one of us—or even the church as a whole—has planned out. We plan confidently, understanding that we are planning out the ways that God can use us to bring about His purposes in our community through St. Paul Lutheran Church and School.

Romans 8:28 And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose.
