***God in an Age of Atheism* by S. Paul Schilling (1969): Book Review**

I would also like to share a note of caution: if you feel inspired to pick up and read this book, then note that a discerning mind is needed while you read this book. This book is dense in nature, and the responses by the author do not always share the LCMS understanding of Christianity on any given topic. To combat this short-coming, I will examine the atheistic thought so that you may know what outsiders say about Christianity. Further, I have developed a biblical basis for some of the findings by the author.

Atheistic Thought

(Not all are represented here, but I have given a basic overview)

There is not only one atheistic thought process out there, but I have noticed that most, if not all, atheistic understandings have a humanistic background. For example, an atheist may say that God is defined as the perfected good qualities of man which he cannot accomplish himself. The atheist may then define God's love for man as "man's own self-love deified" (p.23). Despite these concerning estimations of who God is, the atheist's most dangerous view is that of truth. Since an atheist may say that God is assumed to have certain perfected qualities in the imagination of men, then they conclude that the real atheist is the person who denies that man can know divine truth (p.24). Hence, personal truths become the greater form of truth. The result is the abolition of absolute truth. Morals are thrown out the window to make way for the individual. Moreover, atheistic thought generally would agree that science actually opposes religion because it leaves no room for faith when it explains nature. You may come across an atheistic thought which also believes Christianity was concocted to suppress the and exploit the lower class by the upper class. Overall, the atheistic thought is developing the idea that man is by nature good and can become a Superman if all other suppressions are overcome which includes faith in God.

The Response

The Christian perspective of man does not include that man is by nature good. Indeed, "we confess that we are by nature sinful and unclean" (taken from the common form of confession in DS I-II), and, "I a poor miserable sinner confess..." (taken from the common form of confession in DS III, V). Therefore, our own perspective of man is fundamentally different from the atheist. We believe that the only good we have comes from God, but the atheist would believe that death should not occur if God is real and good. In response, we confess with the words of Scripture "The wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life" (Rom. 6:23). We too confess against the atheist that God is real and provides for us, "In Him, we live and move and have our being" (Acts 17:28). God is creator and remains timeless, like when He spoke to Moses telling him His name, "I am who I am". God describes in these words, who He is. His very existence, His will is to be our deliverer and our only source of salvation. It is who He is to redeem His people and save them from sin, death, and the devil who lay claim on our souls. Truly, as Jesus must be right in John 15:5 when He spoke, "Apart from God we can do nothing". Apart from God there is no life. There is no nature. There is no world. There is nothing.

Next, "God is love" (1 John 4:9). He is not love as a result of our own deified self-love, for any love which we may show - especially in self-love - can be skewed in imperfect. The model of love for the Christian is the surpassing love of God disclosed to us in Jesus Christ. Therefore, the birth, death, and resurrection of Jesus is the deepest form of God's love for us "in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Rom. 5:8). God should not be described as impersonal or far off. Instead, He is with you wherever you go (Matt 28:20). God has chosen to establish His Name (Deut 16:6) on you in Baptism (Matt. 28:19). Therefore, your life is considered the light of the world in which you share the Gospel with anyone who will listen. Your body is also a temple of the Lord (1 Cor. 6:19). Therefore, it is your duty to glorify God in your body.

All these things will proclaim to the atheist that God is real, and it will drive out doubt from you also. So consider your Baptism when God placed His Name on you and declared that He will be with you always. Consider also, as a result, that your body is now a temple for the Lord to dwell. Finally, consider yourself to be the light of the world where you love your neighbor as yourself and thus share your faith by sharing the love that God has given to you.

STEWARDSHIP MINISTRY

Your Past Does Not Define Your Future



New Year's is a celebration of the past and the future. We take stock of the past with thanksgiving and sometimes even relief (that it's over), and we look to the future in hope and anticipation, and perhaps with some worry, for what it holds.

"God Can Do It: We Can Help" The point is that New Year's celebrations remind us of who we are as opposed to who we would like to be, what we have done in comparison to what we want to do. It reminds us of our accomplishments, but mostly it reminds us of our failures. What we've lost. Who we've lost.

New Year's is our own version of Charles Dickens' classic, *A Christmas Carol*. And we all play Scrooge. We are visited by the ghosts of our pasts, presents and futures.

St. Paul writes: "The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that having all sufficiency in all things at all times, you may abound in every good work. As it is written, 'He has distributed freely, he has given to the poor; his righteousness endures forever.' He who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will supply and multiply your seed for sowing and increase the harvest of your righteousness. You will be enriched in every way for all your generosity, which through us will produce thanksgiving to God" (2 Cor. 9:6-15).

St. Paul tells us that the Lord will both supply and increase what we need to give to the church for its work in the world. He tells us that this work God does in us will enrich and bless us in every way, and through this, will produce thanksgiving to God. With this in mind, here is some practical advice to help you take stock of your giving in years past and change what needs to be adjusted, improved, or done away with altogether.

First, attend the Divine Service to receive God's gifts of forgiveness, life and salvation. If you've not been faithful in attending worship to hear the preaching of God's Word, to receive forgiveness and feast on the rich food of our Lord's body and blood for the eternal benefit of your body and soul, then repent and come to receive the gifts God freely gives. God doesn't want your money. He wants you — all of you (Matt. 22:20-22).

Second, pray for the Lord's help. Your right as a Christian is to speak with your Father, the King of all creation, freely through His Son, our Lord, Jesus Christ. Go to the throne of grace and ask for strength and wisdom to follow His bidding faithfully (John 15:1-16).

Third, consider what the church is and what the church does. The church is a place of mercy. It inhales the mercy of the Father by the death, resurrection and ascension of His Son through the preaching of the Gospel and the Sacraments. It exhales this mercy in love toward neighbors. You are a member of the church, of God's family. Thus, you are not only a recipient of God's mercy, but a bearer of that mercy for the life of the world. You spread that mercy through the generous giving of your income to support the work of the church in the world, as the Israelites did in the Old Testament (Lev. 27:1-34).

Fourth, take stock of your current giving in light of the New Testament's teaching on supporting the work of the church. Are you giving of your first fruits, taking it out of your paycheck first, or does God get what's left over? Are you giving voluntarily and cheerfully? Are you giving proportionally and generously? The Old Testament required a tithe, or ten percent. The New Testament gives freedom to be generous, to give more for the Church's work. Are you relying on God's promise to provide and increase what you need to do His work? If your answer is no to any of these, repent. If God gave you His only Son, will He not provide for you all things, even physical things? Trust Him, His Word, and heed it.

So, don't let your past define your future. Rather, commit for the year a generous proportion of your income, which is God's gift to you for this body and life.
