Reflection on an Easter Vigil Reading

(Easter vigil is usually celebrated on the Saturday before Easter Sunday around sunset which marked the beginning of the next day in Jewish culture... The next day being the Sunday of our Lord's resurrection... The basis for an Easter vigil service comes from Luke 24:1 -3 where Jesus was raised sometime before the dawning of the sun.)

Daniel 3:24-25

Then King Nebuchadnezzar was astonished and rose up in haste. He declared to his counselors, "Did we not cast three men bound into the fire?" They answered and said to the king, "True, O king." He answered and said, "But I see four men unbound, walking in the midst of the fire, and they are not hurt; and the appearance of the fourth is like a son of the gods." (For context see Daniel 3:1-30)

Reflection

On Easter vigil there are many readings. Each tells of a salvific work of our God and Father for His people. One reading that just sticks out is this account of the fiery furnace. This is just a great account to read from beginning to end, so I encourage reading the context also, but the specific section in Daniel 3:24-25 includes something that I have never recognized nor seen before. Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego were bound by strong men from the king's army before they were thrown into the fiery furnace (a furnace that was heated to 7x its usual heat). The furnace killed the mighty men that threw these three men into the furnace so that they landed on the ground of the furnace because of their bindings.

That is not the end of the story though because King Nebuchadnezzar was astonished to see something in the furnace. He didn't see three people in the furnace trying to get out, nor were they struggling with their bindings whether it was rope or chain. It also does not mention that he heard them cry out in pain. What Nebuchadnezzar finds astonishing is that there were not three but four men, and these men were not bound by anything. His astonishment likely continued because they were not grappling to get out of the fire nor escape the heat, but they were walking in the midst of the fire without crying out in pain.

The fourth person in the fiery furnace has the unusual characteristic of having the appearance "like a son of the gods". The Lord delivered these three faithful men from the flames so that the only thing that the flame consumed was their binding of rope or chain.

God's judgment on the Last Day will be with fire (Isaiah 66:15-16a; Zephaniah 1:14-18), but, when we are with Jesus in faith, we will be like Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego who were saved out of the flame. We will pass through the fire, but the fire will have no power over us (Malachi 4:1-2). Though the fire of God burns the chaff, His people will be saved and refined through the fire that will burn away every impurity in us (Isaiah 1:25; Isaiah 48:9-11; Malachi 3:2-3, 6; 1 Peter 1:3-9). All that will be left for us is the righteousness of Christ (Is. 43:1-3; Romans 6; 1 Corinthians 15:50-58). Thanks be to Him who gives us eternal life by His resurrection so that we too may have salvation from the judgment of sin!

Hallelujah! He is risen! He is risen indeed! Hallelujah!



Stewardship Spotlight

The Gift of the Gospel

"For this reason, I, Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus on behalf of you Gentiles—assuming that you have heard of the stewardship of God's grace that was given to me for you, how the mystery was made known to me by revelation, as I have written briefly" (Eph. 3:1–3).

There is that word: stewardship. It is a word that so many Christian people balk at. In fact, it isn't really a joke that when the word "stewardship" is mentioned in church, men guard their wallets and women clutch their purses. The Church has earned this response. Over the generations, the Church has allowed the word stewardship to become equated with the financial resources necessary to compensate staff and pay bills.

So, as we consider simple gifts, does it surprise you that Paul would willingly talk about stewardship with the people of Ephesus? Notice what He isn't talking about: money. What Paul is talking about is REAL stewardship, which deals with stewardship of God's grace. That is the Gospel of Jesus Christ!

The greatest gift that our Lord has given us to steward is the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Truthfully, it is the ONLY gift we are given to steward. How you are led by God to steward the resources entrusted to you by God are to be stewarded for the sake of the Gospel. How you use your stuff tells a great deal about what you think of the Gospel. If your stuff is used to help your family, friends, congregation and community to better understand the Gospel, you are a faithful steward. If it is about you and your comforts, or even their comforts, that isn't faithful stewardship.

This perspective is helpful. It also causes us some grief. None of us are always faithful in our stewardship for the sake of the Gospel. What Paul calls us to in these words is repentance. Today we ask the Lord to work in and through our stewardship so that the people around us will KNOW about our stewardship of the Gospel as individuals and as a congregation.


