## St. Paul's Wicks Organ

LET'S DO SOMETHING DIFFERENT THIS MONTH. LET'S VISIT ONE OF OUR PRIMARY TOOLS TO LEAD US IN OUR WORSHIP, ST. PAUL'S 26 RANK, 2 MANUAL, PIPE ORGAN. SOME OF YOU KNOW THAT WHILE OUR PIPE ORGAN SOLDIERS ON, IT IS APPROACHING THE NEED FOR SOME SERIOUS MAINTENANCE.

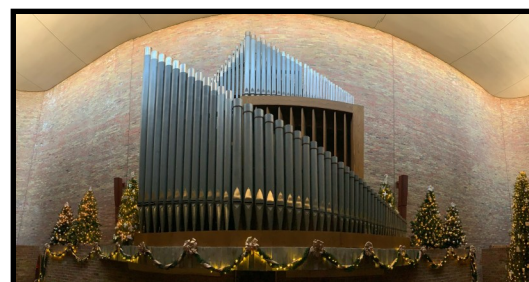
### SOME HISTORY OF OUR ORGAN

WE SHOULD BE EXTREMELY THANKFUL THAT A GROUP OF PEOPLE BACK IN THE EARLY 1970'S DECIDED THAT ST. PAUL SHOULD INVEST IN THE PURCHASE AND INSTALLATION OF A "NEW" ORGAN FOR OUR WORSHIP. IT WAS INSTALLED WITH THE COMPLETION OF OUR CHURCH BUILDING IN 1972 AND A DEDICATORY RECITAL WAS PLAYED BY THE LATE PAUL MANZ, AN ICON IN LUTHERAN CHURCH MUSIC, ESPECIALLY IN LITERATURE FOR THE ORGAN. THE ORGAN THAT WAS PURCHASED AND INSTALLED WAS A COMBINATION OF OLD AND NEW. MOST OF WHAT IS VISIBLE TO THE CONGREGATION WAS BUILT AND INSTALLED NEW IN 1972. HOWEVER, ABOUT 1/2 OF THE ORGAN CAME USED FROM A CHURCH IN TEXAS. THAT INSTRUMENT DATED BACK TO THE 1920S. THE RELAYS WHICH CONNECTED THE KEYBOARDS AND PEDALS TO THE ORGAN PIPES CAME FROM THE OLD ORGAN. WHEN I WAS CALLED AS TEACHER AND MUSICIAN TO ST. PAUL IN 1984 THERE WERE MAINTENANCE ISSUES THAT WERE SLOWLY BUILDING UP MAKING THE ORGAN LESS RELIABLE. WHILE ST. PAUL HAD A SERVICE CONTRACT WITH AN ORGAN BUILDING AND REPAIR COMPANY, IT BECAME APPARENT THAT THE ORGAN WAS NOT BEING SERVICED WELL. WHILE WE WERE BLESSED TO HAVE A GREAT SOUNDING PIPE ORGAN WE WERE IN NEED OF REPLACING THE OLD SYSTEM FROM THE 1920S THAT ALLOWED THE ORGANIST TO PLAY/CONTROL THE ORGAN PIPES FROM THE ORGAN KEYBOARDS. THE CONTACTS IN THE ORGAN CONSOLE (KEYBOARDS, STOP SELECTION, PEDALS, ETC.) ALL INVOLVED COPPER TO COPPER CONTACTS. WE WERE HAVING INCREASING TROUBLES GETTING CONNECTIONS TO WORK AT THE CONSOLE. THERE WAS ALSO THE NEED TO UPDATE THE COMBINATION ACTIONS FOR THE HANDS AND FEET TO MAKE THE ORGAN MORE FUNCTIONAL. FINALLY IN 1994 WE SOUGHT THE HELP OF MICHIGAN CHURCH INSTRUMENTS, INC. TO ASSESS OUR NEEDS AND QUOTE US WHAT IT WOULD COST TO BRING THE ORGAN UP TO MODERN STANDARDS. AFTER MUCH NEGOTIATION AND COMPROMISES ON WHAT WOULD BE NICE VS WHAT WAS NECESSARY, ST. PAUL CAME UP WITH A PLAN FOR THE VERY MODEST COST OF ~\$20,000. WORK BEGAN IN MID-OCTOBER 1995 AND CONTINUED FOR SEVERAL MONTHS WITH MANY UNFORESEEN PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED ALONG THE WAY, SOME OF WHICH STEMMED FROM A POOR INSTALLATION IN 1972 WHICH ONLY BECAME APPARENT OVER TIME. WHEN ALL WAS COMPLETED, THE CONTACTS AND RELAYS WERE CHANGED TO A DIGITAL COMPUTERIZED SYSTEM. THE KEYBOARDS WERE REFITTED TO ELIMINATE ALL CONTACTS AND TO GENERATE MIDI DATA. ADDITIONAL STOP COMBINATIONS WERE ADDED TO MAKE THE ORGAN MORE FUNCTIONAL AND MORE IN LINE WITH ACCEPTABLE STANDARDS. A NEW, LESS COMPLICATED AND MORE RELIABLE SYSTEM OF STOP SELECTION REPLACED THE TROUBLESOME EXISTING SYSTEM. THE COMPUTER SOFTWARE AND CIRCUIT BOARDS THAT CONTROLLED THE NEW SYSTEM WERE FROM A COMPANY IN ENGLAND, MUSICOM, THAT WAS DOING SIMILAR PROJECTS THROUGHOUT THE STATES.

### CURRENT NEEDS

FOR THE NEXT TWENTY - PLUS YEARS THE ORGAN WORKED VERY RELIABLY. A "STATE OF THE ART" INSTRUMENT WHEN INSTALLED WHICH COULD NOW RECORD AND PLAYBACK MIDI DATA. NOW LET'S FAST-FORWARD TO TODAY (2026) AND WE AGAIN ARE IN NEED OF MAINTENANCE, AND SOME OF IT QUITE EXPENSIVE. THERE IS A NEED FOR COMPLETE CLEANING OF THE ENTIRE INSTRUMENT. THIS WAS ALSO DONE BACK IN 1995. THE ORGAN IS A SET OF THOUSANDS OF PIPES WHICH ARE BASICALLY WHISTLES (SOME LITTLE SOME BIG). THERE ARE ABOUT 1500 DIFFERENT PIPES, EACH PLACED OVER ITS OWN VALVE SITTING ON A PRESSURIZED AIR CHEST. OVER TIME DUST BUILDS UP AND CAUSES THEM "TO SPEAK" IN AN INDISTINCT MANNER OR EVEN NOT TO SPEAK AT ALL. ONCE CLEANING IS COMPLETE THE ENTIRE ORGAN CAN AGAIN BE RETUNED AND SET TO A PITCH STANDARD. IMMEDIATE NEEDS ARE ABOUT \$1000 FOR A ONE DAY "TIME AND LABOR" TO TROUBLESHOOT AND FIX SOME SMALL REPAIR ISSUES. (IE SOME "DEAD" NOTES, "CLICKY" VALVES, MUSIC RACK AND LIGHT ISSUES, ETC.) WE HAVE THAT IN THE BUDGET. THE NEXT LEVEL IS ABOUT \$24,000 FOR CLEANING, VOICING, AND TUNING THE ENTIRE ORGAN. THAT WE DO NOT HAVE MONEY FOR. FINALLY, THE BIG TICKET IS APPROXIMATELY \$80,000 TO REPLACE THE SOFTWARE THAT CONTROLS THE ORGAN WITH PROBABLY A DIFFERENT CONSOLE (THE KEYBOARD, PEDAL BOARD AND STOP SELECTIONS). THE CURRENT MUSICOM SYSTEM IS HAVING OCCASIONAL RANDOM SPIKES AND SHORTS AND SOME FAILURES IN TWO OF THE RANKS OF PIPES. MUSICOM IS OUT OF BUSINESS AND WE HAVE NO WAY OF "REPROGRAMMING" OR "REPAIRING" THAT SOFTWARE. WHEN THAT SOFTWARE OR ITS CHIPS FAIL, WE HAVE A BUNCH OF WOOD AND TIN, NO LONGER AN ORGAN. THIS WOULD REPLACE THE CURRENT SYSTEM WITH AN INDUSTRY STANDARD "PETERSON" SYSTEM IN USE IN ABOUT 70% OF PIPE ORGANS TODAY. I THINK WE'RE FINE FOR A WHILE, BUT WE DO NEED TO CATCH UP ON SOME MAINTENANCE. ONE "WISH-LIST" ITEM IS TO COORDINATE THE ACTION OF THE "LOUVERS" ON THE SWELL BOX TO MAKE THEM MORE EFFECTIVE, THAT IS LIKELY TO BE IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD OF \$9,000. IT WOULD IMPROVE ITS FUNCTION BUT IS NOT NECESSARY. FINALLY BY COMPARISON, A ROUGH GUESS PUTS THE COST OF A NEW COMPARABLE SIZED ORGAN BETWEEN \$850,000 AND \$1,000,000. THIS DEPENDS ON THE PARTICULAR MAKE OF ORGAN AND THE EXTRA FUNCTIONS IT HAS. I PUT THIS INFORMATION OUT THERE AS WE RELY HEAVILY ON THE ORGAN TO ACCOMPANY OUR WORSHIP. I THINK WE NEED TO BE CONSIDERING HOW WE MIGHT FACILITATE THE NEXT CYCLE OF ITS SERVICE TO OUR CONGREGATION.

## “ALL IN” ~ from our Vestry Vice-President ~ Steven Carpenter

There’s a scene in the TV Show Ted Lasso where Ted tells his struggling team, “You know what the hardest thing about belief is? ... if you’re going to do it, you’ve gotta go all in. You can’t stay halfway committed just to protect yourself from getting hurt.” And honestly, that idea doesn’t just live in pop culture — we see it echoed throughout Scripture too.

In Luke 21, Jesus points to a poor widow who gives two tiny copper coins and says she gave more than everyone else because she gave all she had. In Luke 5, the first disciples pull their boats onto shore, leave everything behind, and follow Jesus. Faith has always involved trust. It has always called people to go all in — not giving God leftovers, but placing their whole lives in His hands.

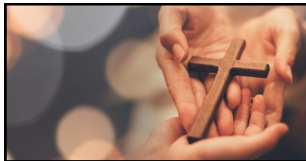
As our Finance Committee discussed, the remaining weeks of the fiscal year, especially during this season of pastoral vacancy, we recognized the importance of focusing on stewardship — not simply as a financial need, but as a way of life. Stewardship is bigger than budgets or offerings; it’s about recognizing that everything we have — our time, talents, and treasures— ultimately belongs to God. That led us to our end-of-fiscal-year 5-week theme: “Everything we have belongs to God—so we live all in.”

Each week has been shaped by voices across our community — students reading Scripture during the service, SPRO leaders sharing announcements and reflections that help carry the message forward, a custom offertory stanza written to match the weekly theme. It’s created a steady rhythm each week, where the theme isn’t just spoken, but actually shared across different parts of our life together.

Even during times of transition, the mission keeps moving through ordinary but faithful acts — people showing up, serving, giving, praying, and caring for one another. Stewardship shows up in all of it: not just dipping a toe in the water, but trusting God fully and living all in together.



## A Legacy of Faith ~ from our Vestry Vice-President ~ Steven Carpenter



Have you walked down the hallway towards the nursery & meeting room lately? Over the past several months, we’ve been hard at work refreshing the pastoral displays — and, in many ways, bringing something new to life by rediscovering something old.

For years, the earliest pastor displayed on our wall was Rev. Herman Kionka — who, surprisingly, was actually SPRO’s 6th pastor. As we dug deeper into our 153-year history, we realized that while 19 pastors have shepherded our congregation over the years, only a small portion were represented on the wall. That discovery led us to Concordia Historical Institute, where, after months of searching through historical records, they were able to uncover seven additional photos of former SPRO pastors — including Rev. George Speckhard, who founded our congregation. Those updated portraits are now on display, so be sure to stop by and take a look!

At the same time, Michigan Church Extension Fund (CEF) graciously provided a \$2,000 grant to support this growing project, now called Faith Across Generations. Along with the restored pastor displays, we’re adding four bulletin boards featuring historic photos and documents from across the life of our church and school — old report cards, baptism certificates, Easter photos, and much more. By the time you’re reading this, we’re hoping many of those displays are already up in the hallway.

More than anything, this project is a reminder that God’s faithfulness to SPRO stretches across generations. And we know there’s still more history waiting to be uncovered. If you have old photos, documents, memorabilia, or stories to share — or if you’d like to help with the displays — we’d love to hear from you.
